Additional Finance Comments: We are applying for the grant because printing costs are increasing, we have lost some advertisers and due to the current situation some advertisers are delaying or finding it hard to settle their invoices.

It may look like we have a healthy cash free reserve but as advertisers pay over the year this has to be used to pay the printing costs and the amount can drop dramatically if we have paid for two or even three issues and are still waiting for advertisers to pay. Also we cannot guarantee the donations we get each year from members of the community.

Project Need/ Support: The community supports the Grampound Times magazine as they provide

articles for each edition advertising events that are due to take place in the village. For example the Village Hall advertised shows that they are selling tickets for and a brief resume of the show, the different organisations give details of how to join them if you are not already a member and during our summer edition it has all the information the Carnival Committee provide for the events taking place running up to the carnival. The different organisations can advertise their events, let the villagers know their news and any fund raising they are proposing. The Church and the School also contribute to the magazine as so the local shop. The adverts are useful if you need a service and would like someone local and anyone can send in requests for birthdays, weddings, births and deaths to be mentioned. There is also a fun quiz which residents take part in and the Parish Council can report on issues they have discussed and wish to share with everyone.

Project Benefits: The magazine benefits the community because it is a way of reaching everyone with news of events in the village and service that are available. It also share current events, news and some historical facts about the village and photos are included from now and in the past. The Grampound Times was published last year even though there were very few events in the village but I think that it benefitted the community because it was something people relied on just to hear new from the village, even though there was not a lot to include.

Also as the Grampound Times is a printed magazine delivered to all residents of the village, it is a source of local information and contact for people who are not able to access information online.

How Many People will Benefit: 380 plus copies of the magazine are circulated to local residents as well as to the wider community as copies go to different organisation eg the Bowling Club whose members do not all live locally but use village facilities. Project Need/ Support: There was considerable initial investment from local villagers and the shop continues to be well supported. The panel installation will help secure the future financial viability of the shop with the ongoing and increasing cost saving on power expenditure.

Project Benefits: The improved financial viability of the shop (energy costs reduced by £600 to £1000 p.a.) will ensure it continues to offer its' services to the Village. The main environmental benefit is, of course, by generating clean power from solar energy. The system is predicted to save 1221 kg of CO2 production or the equivalent of 55 trees planted, EACH YEAR. Grampound Community Fund specifically targets environmental projects and energy efficiency schemes so this project seems like a good use of funds donated by a wind turbine installation.

Applicant: The Merlin MS Centre is a purpose-built facility in Cornwall providing therapies, support and advice to people whose lives (carers and those with the condition) are affected by neurological conditions* including Multiple Sclerosis, Stroke, Parkinson's, Chronic Fatigue Syndrome and other less known conditions. We see around 100 people a day, but receive no statutory income. Therapies include oxygen therapy, physiotherapy, exercise classes, sensory integration, counselling, day respite, community transport, information, support and advice.

Additional Finance Comments: The trustee's policy is to have six months running costs in reserves in line with Charity Commission guidelines. This would equate to £215,000. Due to financial difficulties relating to the pandemic the Trustees have not yet been able to achieve this level of reserves.

The figures above refer to year end 2020. The last audited accounts (year ending 2019) show loans totalling £180,000 which are still outstanding. We are one of the main benefactors in a substantial legacy which guarantees the charity a minimum payment of £200,000 which will be used to cover this debt.

Project Need/ Support: Pre the launch of day respite we consulted with our community - existing clients, carers, volunteers, supporters and other health professionals. Our research found there were very few specialist day respite services in Cornwall, particularly for those with neurological conditions. Most were affiliated to a care home/for the elderly population and tended to be for short-term stays and not appropriate to the needs of our community. Our volunteers enjoy the interaction with clients and the service is well-supported by them. We have been in regular contact with all our service users since the pandemic and since vaccinations they have asked about respite and other services. Carers have also told us that their mental and physical health has been affected and would like respite to resume. One of the main barriers for people in Cornwall to access services is lack of transport - this is due to rural isolation; poor public transport links; cost associated with accessible transport services and the degree of their disability, preventing them from being able to drive independently. The minibus service cannot meet the needs of all our service users but it does support those most in need.

Project Benefits: The charity provides much-needed social and health care services for the whole community of Cornwall, but does not receive any statutory funding. Day respite and the minibus service will give the local neurological community access to specialised therapies and support to help them manage their conditions better; improve their physical and mental well-being; reduce isolation and loneliness for carers and the cared for and provide volunteering opportunities. The centre offers a range of other health services - a one-stop shop for the local community including a GP practice; podiatry and orthotic clinics; counselling services; complementary therapies and when we are allowed to re-open a lovely onsite cafe. Many of these services are for people living in the local community not just for our registered clients. We provide clinical space to both self-employed therapists and statutory/private services. The charity currently employs 9 people and has around 100 volunteers that supports its work. Pre-COVID we saw on average 100 people a day - this number is greatly reduced due to COVID, but we are seeing an increase in numbers as Lockdown restrictions lift and the vaccination programme rolls out.

How Many People will Benefit: As it requires high staff/volunteer to client ratios, we would have 8 client places per day - so 16 people per week to a maximum of 32 people if the service was across four days. Day respite supports carers by providing a break from their caring duties - assuming each client has one primary carer - a further 16 carers per week (up to 32), so potentially the service will directly support 64 people per week. The project also provides volunteer opportunities. We usually have four respite volunteers per session (8-16 pw) and 2-4 drivers per day.

Access: Initially two days a week at the Centre for registered service users. However, anyone in Cornwall with a neurological or long-term health condition, can apply for a place. We promote it to registered clients, carers, statutory and voluntary health/social care providers; through local media and our social media channels.

Charges: Between £35 and £45 per day (MS clients receive a higher subsidy) including lunch. There is no charge for the minibus, but we encourage donations.

Ownership of Project Site: The Merlin MS Centre

Maintenance / Sustainability / Legacy: The day respite service has been supported by fundraising activities, grants and contributions service users make for since it was started in 2014. This grant is to adapt a space and fund some running costs of the minibus service. Once it has been spent we will continue to fund the service through income generation activities and the contributions from service users.

Additional Income: The service user contribution for respite services will be around £15,000 per annum.

Supplementary Information: These are exceptional times - many income generation activities were curtailed due to restrictions, so we have focused our efforts on grant fundraising. The COVID pandemic came shortly after a major restructure at the charity to ensure it was financially stable and resilient - our business development plan had to be put on hold due to reduced capacity at the Centre when we reopened. Staff are on flexi-furlough, but as we resume services we will need to bring staff back fully to deliver our services, while still having restrictions on fundraising activities.

Comments: The group were contacted for further information regarding the workshops and they add: "In the past we delivered a variety of workshops for our day respite clients provided by external providers. I had already looked at some virtual options for service users who are self-isolating and not yet coming into the centre to do activities online so I had received some quotes, while we are still in Lockdown this could also be an option for day respite clients as the room we want to adapt was previously a training room so has IT equipment including a large screen already installed. Ideally, we would have people to deliver the workshops in person, but not until there are changes to social distancing. Workshops provide a variety of activities and stimulation for people who have both physical and cognitive difficulties; help them learn new skills; improve well-being; and teach healthy life skills."

COVID-19

During the first lock down the Centre was closed from March to July 2020 - we were able to reopen in July and resume services with some significant changes (staff in full PPE, one way systems, reduced capacity

and sanitise points to be COVID-compliant). However our day respite clients have more complex physical, cognitive and personal needs and are vulnerable to the virus so they have been shielding for 12 months plus. The service also relies on a lot of volunteers and many have also been self-isolating. After receiving the vaccination the confidence of both clients and volunteers is returning and they wish to come back. Resuming the service will also give much-needed respite to carers too who have struggled during the pandemic coping with challenges of being a sole unpaid carer without the support of their family and social networks or the Centre's facilities.

Project Description: The Limes is the oldest part of the Manor Tannery which operated in Grampound for 300 years. A stream runs through the site and out into a stream. It carried water to the industrial areas. Over the past few winters the volume of rainwater cascading through the site has caused damage to the outlet and the fragile industrial area and shifted a lot of silt into the lime pits and associated spaces making it dangerous to work in. We need to make alterations to the outlet and the adjacent Cornish hedge where the excess of water has undermined the corner and made it unstable. Once altered it will allow the volunteers to safely return to the site to work.

This small, important site is acknowledged by Cornwall Council Historic Environment Team who are wholly supportive of the project to conserve and restore but currently have no funds to offer.

Additional Finance Comments:

The Heritage Project is a committee of the Parish Council who allow us the use of the ground floor in the Town Hall for the Heritage Centre and who pay the bills associated with that - electricity, insurance etc. and cover stationery and some sundries.

The small funds raised by the Heritage Centre sales and events go in to the Parish Council accounts and can be used towards specific projects. We can ask the Parish Council for a modest sum each year but aim to raise funds for bigger projects and ad-hoc events as any other village group does.

Project Need/ Support: The Limes was leased to the village in 2015 because of its' importance to the existence of the village. Since then we have kept the community informed of the intentions of the Heritage Group through the Grampound Times magazine, annual exhibitions and ad-hoc events. We have the support of the Cornwall Council Historic Environment Team who are our Professional mentors. The past belongs to everyone and many of us want to keep history alive for future generations but to ensure that we are doing what the community wants we delivered a survey to every household in October 2020 asking them for their views on the project at The Limes. It covered the history of the site, the current situation and the future of the site. We asked questions with yes or no answers with space for any other comments. 66% responded positively and 34% negatively to the existence, restoration and curatorship of the site.

Our team of volunteers changes size, typical of any volunteer group, and covid has stopped us working but we have new members waiting to join in and look forward to getting the alteration work done to ensure that they are safe and work can re-commence.

Project Benefits: The Limes is situated adjacent to a footpath on a circular route around the village. To understand our past we need only step outside our own doors and be proud of our long association with industry. We aim to keep the history of the tannery alive by exposing the site and erecting information panels showing how it worked and benefitted the village for over 300 years. It is continuing to do so by giving people the opportunity to meet here socially and to become involved with local history. The site used to have a duck pond which we aim to reinstate, a move that we know has support among many in the village. There is a meadow area where we aim to put seating and, once the pits and paths are made safe, the area will settle back as a visible habitat for wildlife and birds. This site lives in our landscape and people enjoy it.

Volunteers will be required at regular intervals for the upkeep of the site, thus providing opportunity for new generations to work here, to understand it and pass it on.

Grampound is an historic village and visitors to the village and Heritage Project are welcomed.

How Many People will Benefit: The parish of Grampound with Creed has approx. 700 people. The Heritage Project has a number of visitors during the year, some specifically come to see the old tannery and would estimate 20 - 30 per annum. We include it on our 'Walk and Talk' events and post covid hope to attract 50 - 60 people per annum. We have no count of the numbers of ad-hoc walkers who use this route but it will be advertised by a walk leaflet, mobile app. and on our Facebook page so hope for another 100 per annum.

We have discussed it with Grantscape and the project is now well under way using on-line methods. We have not included it in our financial statement for this reason. It will be completed by July as agreed.
